Our Four Children and their B'nai Mitzvah Experiences

Whew...At the end of the bar/bat mitzvah weekend, a happy feeling of relief and exhaustion settles in. As each of our three weekends culminated, pride, accomplishment and gratitude filled us up. These events were a milestone in the Jewish journey, but certainly not an end.

As I reflect on the b'nai mitzvah of our four children, my heart is full of warm memories of the day of Abigail's Bat Mitzvah in 2012, Sarah's Bat Mitzvah in 2015, and Max and Jonah's B'nai Mitzvah in 2018. However, not just the individual days, but the entire process and our deep daily connection to Judaism come to mind.

For my family, preparing is not just about the day of, but rather a path of Jewish learning and real-life engagement as we moved towards this significant milestone and now beyond. Fortunately for us, this is an integral mission of Beth El's B'nai Mitzvah program as well.

In fifth grade, Beth EI students enter the TaRBuT program to begin preparation. Unlike many training programs, this one focuses on learning to be able to participate and lead throughout their lives. When I studied for my own Bat Mitzvah, it was in preparation for the day of and with the assistance of a cassette tape - memorizing Torah, Haftarah, and all the prayers that I would recite or lead on the bimah on that day. In contrast, my four children alongside their peers and individually with the Rabbis, Cantor, and teachers, learned the lifelong skills of reading Torah and leading prayer by examining the text, learning Torah and Haftarah trope, and understanding the "whys" behind the various traditions, services, and commandments.

At our simchas, our out of town family members who came to share in celebration, smothered us with positive feedback about the vibrant Shabbat community of engagement that is Beth El. At Max and Jonah's B'nai Mitzvah, one cousin said, "It is amazing to see learning going on in every single nook and around every corner."

To me, having TaRBuT take place on Shabbat morning is genius. It welcomes families to Beth El, builds community, and creates a deeper connection and commitment to Shabbat for our children. Additionally, via Junior Congregation, the TaRBuT students actually experience the spirituality of communal prayer as they recite in a service setting.

Following their B'nai Mitzvah, all of our children continue to come to Beth El on Shabbat mornings to attend services, to learn to teach in the Rimonim post B'nai Mitzvah program, and to be TaRBuT teaching and testing staff. For all of this, we are grateful.
