

WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

A group of mothers gathered for coffee begin sharing their children's latest accomplishments.

One boasts that her son is a doctor; another has a son who is a judge. A third speaks of her daughter, the professor. One woman is quiet through it all. Finally, they turn to her and ask: "Well, what does your son do?"

"He's a rabbi!"

"A rabbi? What kind of a profession is that for a nice Jewish boy?"

Jokes aside, we love what we do. We consider it a privilege to serve as your rabbis and cantor, to stand before you to teach, to lead you in prayer, to officiate at your life cycle events and more.

What motivates us? What gives us the energy to work until the late hours of the night, on weekdays and weekends? You do. Nothing gives us greater joy than to hear that our teaching has challenged you, our song has touched you, our words have motivated you, our deeds have supported you.

Now, we are the first to admit that we don't always inspire. But that is our goal. We seek to share with you the wisdom, meaning, and joy we find in Judaism.

In many synagogues, rabbis and cantors are referred to as klei kodesh, holy vessels. This term comes from the Torah's detailed description of the Tabernacle. There, the ark, menorah, table, incense altar, etc. used by the kohanim in their service are designated as klei kodesh.

Referring to rabbis and cantors, this term can come across as arrogant: "Look at us, we are holy vessels." For that reason, the three of us rarely use it. But we should understand the phrase for it captures how we view our role – not as vessels of holiness but instruments for holiness. We are not "holier than thou." We see ourselves as servants, serving God and the congregation. We feel called upon to help manifest holiness in our lives, in our community, in our world. This takes many different forms.

When our b'nai mitzvah students rise to lead us in prayer, when our adults stand before us to teach us as a Shabbat summer darshan (speaker), when our young families tell us they incorporated what we studied into their lives, when a senior takes to heart a conversation we had and is moved to support community, we take great pride. And we consider it an honor to be part of your lives and to help shape Beth El into a kehillah k'dosha, a holy community.

We take great pride in the many ways Beth El has touched people's lives.

The Disambiguation of Kehillah

There are, of course, deep Jewish definitions of kehillah–far better described by our clergy than a synagogue president. That being said, I consulted "Dr. Wikipedia" as one of my sources to research this article. When Wikipedia cannot specifically define a word or topic, such as kehillah, it often employs the pseudo-sophisticated term, *disambiguation*. IT TAKES A VILLAGE TO Teach Community

Over the course of the school year, I often hear parents express a variety of reasons why they send their children to Talmud Torah. Many focus on the specific areas of study in which we immerse our students—Hebrew, Israel, Jewish Living, Holidays, History, Tanach, and Music—all of the tools for potentially living an intentional Jewish life. But at the core of each of these conversations is that parents want to create a sense of COMMUNITY for their children and for their extended families. They want the shared knowledge, skills, and experiences that come with the supplemental Jewish education that we provide to be the primary catalyst for their children to connect with EACH OTHER, in addition to learning and living their traditions.

From our earliest biblical and rabbinic teachings, the education of our children has been an integral part of the fabric that builds and sustains Jewish communities. "And these words, which I command you this day, shall be upon your heart; and you shall teach them diligently to your children..." [Deut. 6:6-7]. Here, the Torah challenges us to not only receive God's mandates, but to make sure they are passed along to our children as a communal legacy.

In The Observant Life: The Wisdom of Conservative Judaism for Contemporary Jews, Rabbi Eliezer Diamond reminds us that "the obligation to provide a Jewish education is COMMUNAL as well as parental. The Talmud [BT, Bava Batra, 21a] attributes an ordinance to Joshua ben Gamla, one of the last High Priests of the Second Temple period, requiring each community to provide for the religious education of all its children from the age of six or seven. Jewish communities throughout the ages have taken on the responsibility, providing Jewish education to their youth. Consequently, federations and other communal institutions should make it their top priority to increase the availability and affordability of Jewish education for all Jewish children. After all, it is Jewish education that is the most important guarantor of Jewish continuity; more crucially, it is only through education that we can create a Jewish COMMUNITY worth perpetuating."

Registration for the 2019-2020 academic year (https://www.talmudtorahmpls.org/registration) for new and continuing students is open now and will continue through the first day of school on September 8th! Together, let's build and nurture our COMMUNITY!!

Finding Your Path

My husband Beni and I first attended services at the old Beth El on the North Side. As young immigrants having been sponsored into the United Stated by Fern and Bernie Badzin (zikhronam livrakhah), we found the old Beth El very welcoming to a young couple of immigrants from Cuba. After a couple of years we left the city for Beni to complete his training in obstetrics in Detroit, returning three years later. At that time there were three of us; our oldest daughter Sonia was almost ready to begin her formal Jewish education. The next school year she was ready to attend the Aleph Preschool, which at the time occupied the corner end of the lot where the new synagogue building (our current building) was in the planning stages. Eventually the construction of the new building was completed and our second daughter, Amy, was a member of the first group of children who attended the new Aleph Preschool in the new building! It was at that time that I became involved in Women's League to the best of my ability as a mom with young children. And it was so important to me that I did.

As the years passed and with a third daughter, Dina (who also eventually enrolled in the Aleph Preschool!) I became more active in Women's League as I understood the important role this group of dedicated women play in the smooth function of our beloved synagogue. I was inspired by the depth of Women's League's involvement in fundraising and the variety of activities at Beth El they helped support. Over the years, these activities have included: Aleph Preschool receiving a yearly contribution for supplies; many lunches on Shabbat when there are no b'nai mitzvah and kiddush cups for b'nai mitzvah. Beyond those funds, I was inspired by the commitment to volunteerism by Women's League—members provide volunteers whenever necessary.

Our Women's League is not just about hamantaschen and knishes, or even our Gift Shop, known throughout the city with the varied array of tallitot and kippot and other religious items necessary for us to live Jewish lives. But I am worried. We have had such a deep impact as a Women's League—just as Beth El has had a profound impact on me. But our Women's League Board realized that over the last few years, our membership has dwindled. Our core group is comprised of a few elderly ladies who, because of our age, are either passing on or are not capable of continuing the work we have been doing during all these many years, especially at the pace we are used to. We need to find a way to interest a younger sector of our Beth El women to help continue that impact. We need to inspire and engage younger women to find their own path to involvement – because Beth El still has the needs Women's League used to fill. Even if it's not Women's League, or Women's League 2.0 – I wonder what will be done to take the baton from one generation to the next. I am hopeful that a cohort of that next generation will pave their own path towards supporting our shul and that they too shall be blessed with finding meaning in our community and in finding a way to pass the baton when it's their turn.
